Eight CAS members were in attendance, along with about thirty-five guests, and despite the lingering presence of high clouds from the forest fires out west, the observing under the dark skies of Highland County was generally excellent.

• The second was held on Friday night of the October New Moon weekend, and conditions were near-perfect, with even the faintest constellations clearly visible. Only six club members were present, along with a number of familiies with children in tow, and both guests and members reported that these were some of the darkest skies they'd ever seen; one guest described the experience with his family as "being one of their highlights of the last decade."


